From the Pastor

On Sunday June 5, following our 9:15 AM Worship Service, we will engage in a Congregational Conversation centered on whether our outside doors should be locked during Worship. It was wisely suggested that we not call this a Congregational Meeting since we are not taking any votes and the goal of our gathering is to hear each other's perspectives. There is not one correct answer or perspective but numerous ones, impacting whether we believe the doors should be unlocked or

locked during Worship. We need to hear yours.

As an Open and Affirming Congregation, we strive for diversity in the make-up of our Congregation. We acknowledge that we are not all exactly the same. That is a good thing. Our

perspectives therefore are not always the same. This can make us nervous and perhaps uncomfortable sharing. We are generally not comfortable with disagreement, particularly if it may lead to conflict. We have legitimate fears that our perspective might not be respected or taken seriously. Many of us have experienced disrespect, or silencing, or the delegitimizing of our perspectives in the past simply because of our gender, sexuality, economic status, race, culture, abilities, age, or other factors. As an ONA Congregation we have pledged to make every effort to ensure that does not happen within our life together, recognizing that we fail at Our Congregational Conversation is an times. opportunity for all to share safely and respectfully, offering our personal perspectives and refraining from making judgements.

During our Congregational Conversation, we will all be invited to share our perspectives about whether our doors should be unlocked or locked during Worship, and why we feel that way. We will not be debating each other or trying to prove that someone else's perspective is wrong. Rather we will be sharing our perspective and listening carefully to other people's perspectives. This may feel countercultural, especially during our current atmosphere

where seemingly everyone is trying to prove that anyone with a different opinion than their own is wrong and there is no room for compromise.

People have already been sharing their perspectives with Consistory Members, Pastor Allyssa, and me. There are no wrong perspectives but there are differences in perspective. One person feels unsafe and a potential target in our Sanctuary because of past shootings in Churches, or other locations, and therefore wants our doors locked. Another person

feels because LGBTQ+ feel unwelcome in Churches, even when those Churches locked door means they

have been lied to again and are not really welcome. Are either of these perspectives

wrong or not worthy of being heard and considered? No. And if we are going to make decisions that require some compromise, we need to better understand our varied perspectives. The purpose of this Congregational Conversation is to listen and to share. We will not take any votes at this gathering. After the gathering, Consistory will determine what changes, if any, we will make to our security policies during Worship.

Living within a diverse community in which all people are accepted and respected for who they are broadening our personal requires а of understandings and perspectives. We primarily achieve that through increasing our understanding of our histories and the current reality in which we live, and through conversations where we respectively speak and listen to each other. Our Congregation has entered into a covenant with God, ourselves and the wider community stating that we value diversity, equality and acceptance, and that we will work to make that happen within our life together here and the wider world. Our Congregational in Conversation is part of that work. We look forward to seeing all who are able there, and hearing from you, and listening to each other. Peace, Rev. John

Spotlight on Sacred Art

Welcome to a new feature in our monthly epistle. Here we'll highlight symbols, emblems, and other aspects of our church's art and architecture, explain their meaning, and reveal a little about their history. This month, our spotlight is on the **Chi Rho** symbol and **red paraments**.

The **Chi Rho** (pronounced "kai row;" rhymes with "high low") is one of the earliest forms of christogram. A christogram is a monogram, or combination of letters, that forms an abbreviation for the name of Jesus Christ. It may look like the letters 'X' and 'P' put together, but those are actually letters from the Greek alphabet: chi (X) and rho (P). They are the first two letters of the word XPIΣTOΣ, *Christos*, which means "Christ" in Greek. You can spot the Chi Rho on our Christ Candle and on our white pulpit parament.





Paraments are the pieces of fabric that adorn the altar table, pulpit, and lectern in our sanctuary. Their colors (called liturgical colors) represent the seasons and special occasions in the church year. Red is the liturgical color for celebration.

St. Paul's, the **red paraments** are used on Pentecost Sunday, and for

confirmations and ordinations. In many places around the world, the Day of Pentecost is synonymous with red. But in Great Britain, the Church calls Pentecost "Whitsun" or "Whitsunday," a contraction of "White Sunday." This naming quirk is a result of the Norman Conquest, when French-speaking Normans confused the English word "white" with "wit," meaning wisdom or understanding, a reference to the

outpouring of wisdom by the Holy Spirit on the disciples. If you were worshiping at St. Paul's 70 years ago, you might remember our old E&R hymnal which used the word "Whitsunday" instead of Pentecost. Our red pulpit parament displays the image of a ship that includes a symbol on its sail. This may look like a Chi Rho, but it's actually another Greek monogram called the staurogram, or Tau Rho, made from the Greek letters tau (T) and rho (P). *Stauros*, ΣΤΑΥΡΟΣ, means "cross" in Greek, and may have visually represented Jesus on the cross in biblical manuscripts from the 4th, 5th, and 6th centuries. Don't hesitate to walk up to the pulpit, lectern, and altar table on Pentecost to get a closer look at the red paraments!

WHAT IS A PASTORAL RELATIONS COMMITTEE?

The Pastoral Relations committee is a standing committee that seeks to support and maintain an open and healthy relationship between the Pastor and members of the congregation. The committee serves in two primary ways: as an advisory group to the Pastor and as a support for the Pastor's leadership. As an advisory group, the committee shares ideas, dreams, hopes, expectations, and concerns of the congregation with the Pastor. As support for the Pastor, the committee interprets roles, functions, and needs of the Pastor to the congregation.

Constructive and caring communication, in an atmosphere of confidentiality and trust, is essential to the work of the committee. This committee is the congregation's fundamental support group for the Pastor. It builds the framework in which conflict can be dealt with creatively. Its goals are the professional growth and well-being of the Pastor, and the promotion of mutual ministry between the Pastor and the congregation.

The basic reason for sustaining open and healthy Pastor-people relationships through the work of this committee is to enhance the effectiveness of the church's mission. The nurture of the Pastor by this committee not only fosters a wholesome and healthy congregation, but also creates a climate in which the spiritual life and mission of the people are strengthened. Serious attention to the dynamics of the relationship between Pastor and congregation can result in a local church able to carry out its ministry effectively.

STRENGTHEN THE CHURCH OFFERING Sunday, June 5th, 2022

"The last two years have told a remarkable story about the resilience of our churches and their leaders.

This has been hard. Leaders are tired. Leaders are anxious. Leaders are beleaguered. Leaders are traumatized.

But every day, and in countless ways, leaders in the church demonstrate the power of faith in the risen Christ as they embody the spirit of Paul himself who wrote that we will `rejoice in all circumstances' and 'we do not grieve as those who have no hope.' Two years into this pandemic, we struggle to name a more devastating season through which we have all lived. And yet still we see signs of life and resilience and ingenuity and growth and enduring hope.

There are stories of how college students left for college and for the first time since anyone can remember they were still able to worship every week with their home church.

One church noticed their members were struggling with a variety of mental health issues. They brought a counselor on to their staff who set up an office in the church to provide therapeutic care to them. The pastor noticed that neighbors who had never been to the church were also suffering - and the counselor began to meet regularly with them as well. Now, there is a full-time mental health specialist on staff who serves not just the church, but the neighborhood.

Many of our settings are reporting that their giving rose in 2021, a sign that even in the midst of deep sorrow our better angels emerge with a desire to support those who suffer and those who care for the suffering.

Churches that feared losing all their members when we all quarantined learned how to connect virtually for pastoral visitation, prayer, worship, and fellowship. They not only didn't lose their members, many grew by finding an audience who were only ever going to be found in the virtual spaces they occupy and find safe.

Our churches remain strong in the Lord.

All that we do to Strengthen Our Churches extends the kingdom of God. Preaching the gospel is our collective calling. Even a raging global pandemic cannot suppress either our desire or ability preach that gospel, nor the Spirit's ability to change lives when we do.
