OPENING PRAYER (Responsive)

Minister: Today, God, we remember Your pain, a crown of thorns, public disgrace, nails

hammered through living flesh, blood streaming from open wounds, lungs starved of

air, slow agony as life drains away.

All: At the foot of the cross, we weep for the pain we cannot stop and cannot bear.

Minister: We weep for the victims of violence, for the innocent who suffer from war and famine

and disease. For the refugees and immigrants, both documented and

undocumented, who have sought safety only to be met with more fear and hostility.

All: We weep for the victims of injustice, for the homeless ones who wander the

streets and sleep in shop doorways, for the hopeless ones who suffer behind bars.

Minister: We weep for the victims of economic forces, for the ones who have no work and no

money and have lost their self-respect.

All: We weep for the lonely, isolated people who are the targets of other people's

prejudice and are defenseless in the face of taunts and mockery.

Minister: We weep for our own pain.

All: At the foot of the cross, we weep for the pain we cannot stop and cannot bear.

Minister: You have borne it, Lord, You bear it with us, and Your love is stronger than all our pain,

stronger even than death.

All: We thank You for the love that bears the cross and enters into death willingly for

humankind; for Your love that lives and grows in the world by Your Spirit in all who

reach out to tend the wounds of others.

Minister: We thank You for the love that comes to us when we are in pain and other people's

hands reach out to soothe the hurt and calm our fear....

All: At the foot of the cross, we weep for the pain we cannot stop and cannot bear and

yet we know that You have borne it, Lord; You bear it with us and Your love is

stronger than all our pain, stronger even than death. Amen.

Minister: We began 40 days and nights ago, a day of ashes, a day where we once again began

our journey to reflect, to grow in faith, and to renew our devotion to God and to the

Minister: We recognized the temptation that we must do everything for ourselves, and Jesus'

teaching that we are meant to be in community, helping one another.

All: And now we are at the cross.

Minister: We recognized the temptation that life should be easy and without suffering, and

Jesus' teaching that we each must pick up our crosses and make sacrifices if we are

to be his disciples.

All: And now we are at the cross.

Minister: We recognized the temptation of thinking that all life should function like a

marketplace, and Jesus' teaching that relationships are to be marked by compassion,

care, and love, lived out in covenant with each other.

All: And now we are at the cross.

Minister: We recognized the temptation of us thinking we are better than everyone else, and

Jesus' teaching of the necessity for humility, empathy and loving our neighbors as

ourselves.

All: And now we are at the cross.

Minister: We recognized the temptation of allowing fear to rule our lives, silencing us, and

Jesus' teaching that even death is not the final word, that new life is always possible.

All: And now we are at the cross.

Minister: We recognized the temptation to run away from commitments and choose to stand

on the sidelines when we are challenged or at risk, and Jesus' modeling of courage born from understanding we are never alone, that together with God and each other,

we can emerge into new life.

All: And now we are at the cross.

Minister: We now decide, once again, if we will give into temptations or live as Jesus taught us

and showed us how to live. Amen.

THE SEVEN LAST WORDS OF JESUS

THE FIRST WORD

Luke 23:33-34

When they came to the place called "The Skull," they nailed Jesus to the cross there with the two criminals, one on his right and one on his left. Jesus said "Forgive them, Father! They do not know what they are doing."

Leader: Lord Jesus - you gave your life for us.

People: You did not turn away from suffering and died that we might be made whole.

Silent Meditation ending with Chime.

THE SECOND WORD

Luke 23:39-43

One of the criminals hanging there threw insults at him: "Aren't you the Messiah? Save yourself and us!" The other one, however, rebuked him, saying: "Don't you fear God? Here we are all under the same sentence. Ours, however, is only right, for we are getting what we deserve for what we did; but he has done no wrong." And he said to Jesus, "Remember me, Jesus, when you come as King!" Jesus said to him, "I tell you this: Today you will be in Paradise with me."

THE THIRD WORD John 19:25-27

Standing close to Jesus' cross were his mother, his mother's sister, Mary the wife of Clopas, and Mary Magdalene. Jesus saw his mother and the disciple he loved standing there; so he said to his mother, "Woman, here is your son." Then he said to the disciple, "Here is your mother." And from that time the disciple took her to live in his home.

THE FOURTH WORD

Mark 15:33-34

And when the sixth hour had come, there was darkness over the whole land until the ninth hour. And at the ninth hour Jesus cried with a loud voice, "Eloi, Eloi, lema sabachthani?" which means, "My God, my God, why have You forsaken me?"

Silent Meditation ending with Chime.

THE SIXTH WORD John 19:29-30

A bowl was there, full of cheap wine mixed with vinegar, so a sponge was soaked in it, put on a stalk of hyssop, and lifted up to his lips. When Jesus had received the wine, he said, "It is finished."

Read Reflection Extinguishing the Candle

THE SEVENTH WORD

Luke 23:46

Then Jesus, crying with a loud voice, said, "Father, into Your hands I commit my spirit!" And having said this he breathed his last.

Silent Meditation ending with Chime.

And forgive us our debts, as we forgive our debtors. And lead us not into temptation but deliver us from evil. For thine is the kingdom, and the power, and the glory, forever. Amen.

SUGGESTIONS FOR TIMES OF SILENT PRAYER AND MEDITATION

Many of us are not used to sitting in silence. Since there are numerous times we do that during this Service, the following are ideas for how to do so. During the sharing of Jesus' seven last "words," there will be silent meditations of about two minutes each time.

Place both your feet flat on the floor. Find a comfortable spot to place your hands, resting them on a surface. Try breathing in through your nose and out through your mouth. Pay attention to how your body breathes for you, without you thinking about it. Try relaxing your body as much as possible.

You can focus your attention on any number of things. Don't beat yourself up over what you end up thinking about. Gently send along thoughts that are better dealt with another time. Try focusing first on the "word" or phrase Jesus said, and its context. Recall the meditation upon that "word;" what was the point or points of the meditation. Pray for people you know. Pray for people you don't know. Pray for the whole of Creation. Ask that God will speak to you, and then really listen.

We believe it will become a little easier, each two-minute silent meditation. Perhaps by the end, you will wish they lasted a little longer.
