FROM THE PASTOR

If we are fortunate, our lives include both concerns and celebrations. The potential richness of life is risked if we minimize the reality of either of these two. God is found, God is present both in our sufferings and in our joys. To fully embrace our Faith, to fully embrace life, we must be present as well to the range of our experiences. To experience God's compassion for ourselves and others, as well as God's delight, is to live as we were created to live.

It is appropriate for us to be concerned about the rise of Christian Nationalism, particularly White Christian Nationalism. We are seeing this influence in our politics in very negative ways and to a greater and greater extent. By making use of Christianity, and twisting its meaning and appropriate practice, certain politicians have made who we vote for a test of one's loyalty to Christianity. The problem is it is their version of Christianity. It is a version of Christianity that is exclusive, authoritarian, and violent. It bears little resemblance to Jesus' words and ways.

As Christians, we must be very careful not to be swayed by those who claim their version of Christianity is the only authentic one and should therefore be the only way Christianity is practiced. As Americans, we must also be very careful and remember that our country was founded by those who were seeking to flee from Christian religious persecution, attempts to force everyone to be Christian in the same way those in power were. We were founded not as a Christian nation but as a nation in which the practice of one's faith, Christian or otherwise, was not to be controlled or dictated by any one version of Christianity or any Faith. Christian Nationalism ignores that history, as it also ignores other parts of our history that critique the harm Christians have done or participated in. Their words and actions are not a return to some forgotten past but rather an attempt to create a future which is antithetical to Democracy and seeks to impose both the religious and economic will of some upon the many. This reflects the ideals and practices of neither American Democracy nor Christianity.

Rather than pretending this is not a concern, we need to look honestly at what is going on and decide who and what we will support. We need to vote. Voting is a right and a responsibility. May we each exercise it carefully. And may we know, that unlike the exclusive vision and practice of Christian Nationalism, St. Paul's will continue to welcome one and all.

In the midst of this concern and others, we have celebrations to engage in. Our Stewardship Drive is in full swing which means we will have the opportunity to contemplate our financial and volunteer-time pledges and offer them to God on Stewardship Sunday November 13. Our creative and wonderful Stewardship Baskets have been readied for auction and bids begin on Thursday November 3. Harvest Dinner will be offered as a sit-down gathering again this year, a chance for us to share a meal together following our Service on November 13. We will host Pastor Allyssa Boyer's Ordination Service on Sunday November 27 at 3:00 PM, where we and members of the Mercersburg Association and Penn Central Conference will join together in celebrating the culmination of this part of Allyssa's journey, which our Congregation has been an intricate part of, and the beginning of a new journey for her as an Ordained Pastor. We will begin our Advent Reading group on Monday November 28. All this just in November, which ushers us further into the Advent Season of preparation for the celebration of Christmas. Christmas, where we rejoice that God came into the world as a vulnerable baby and lived as the

person Jesus, who came to know our concerns and celebrations, and who continues to be with us in all of them to this day. May we indeed embrace the fullness of our lives and God's presence, which never leaves us.

Spotlight on Sacred Art

In this feature of our monthly epistle, we highlight symbols, emblems, and other aspects of our church's art and architecture, explain their meaning, and reveal a little about their history. This month, our spotlight is on six of the **shields of the apostles**.

The word *apostle* is from a Greek word meaning "one who is sent." In the Gospels, Jesus chooses twelve apostles from among his disciples whom he sends on a mission of preaching and healing. Each of the apostles is represented by a shield on the chancel wall of our sanctuary. The six apostles' shields on the northern/left side of the chancel wall are (top to bottom):

- 1. **Matthew:** Three moneybags represent Matthew's work as a tax collector before Jesus's call. He is the patron saint of accountants, bankers, and civil servants.
- 2. **Simon:** A fish lies on top of a bible. Simon, originally a fisherman, became a "fisher of people" by sharing the Gospel message.
- 3. **Bartholomew** (a.k.a. Nathaniel): Curved flensing knives represent the manner of Bartholomew's martyrdom; he was flayed alive. Bartholomew is the patron saint of leathermakers.
- 4. James the Great: The scallop shell represents pilgrimage. According to legend, James's remains are held in Santiago de Compostela in Spain. The traditional pilgrimage to James's grave is known as the "Way of St. James" and it has been one of the most popular pilgrimages for Western Christians from the Early Middle Ages to today. Shells have come to symbolize pilgrimage because there are so many along the Spanish coast.
- 5. Thaddeus (a.k.a. Jude): A ship; Thaddeus sailed to many ports on his journeys as a missionary. Tradition holds that Thaddeus preached the Gospel in Judea, Samaria, Idumaea (present-day Jordan), Syria, Mesopotamia (present-day Iraq), Libya, Lebanon, and Turkey.
- 6. **Philip:** The loaves of bread on either side of the cross remind us of Philip's comment to Jesus in the story of the multiplication of the loaves and fishes (John 6:5-7).

We are so blessed! There will still be money trickling in for pot pie sales, but our total net profit at this point is \$13,445. This exceeds our goal of \$12,000 - YAY!!!
